YEAR 8 EXPLORES THE WILD AT CHESTER ZOO

In March, the science department took 120 Year 8 pupils on an educational trip to Chester Zoo. The visit aimed to enhance the students' understanding of animal biology and conservation efforts. During the day, pupils explored various enclosures, observed a wide range of species up close, and took part in interactive workshops led by zoo staff based on evolution.



The trip provided a hands-on learning experience that complemented their classroom studies, and the students returned with a greater appreciation for wildlife. The day was both enjoyable and informative, leaving a lasting impression on everyone involved.

BRITISH SCIENCE WEEK 2025

In March, Year 7 and 8 pupils took a break from their regular science topics to participate in British Science Week. With the theme "Adapt and Change", students engaged in activities like designing whirly birds, creating timers using chemical reactions, and developing animals adapted to various environments.



The week concluded with a fun competition where pupils made models of aliens from distant planets, explaining how they had adapted to life there. The entries were fantastic, and prizes were awarded in every class.

SOLAR ECLIPSE 2025

In anticipation of the solar eclipse on 29th March, the science department gave out 200 pairs of solar eclipse glasses to students for outstanding work in class. This allowed students to safely view the partial solar eclipse, a rare event in the UK. The next partial eclipse won't be until August 2026, making this a special opportunity for those who participated.

PUPILS EXCEL IN ENGINEERING CHALLENGE

On Friday 28th March, Burnley College hosted a Design Technology competition for local high school students, featuring hands-on engineering challenges.

Twelve Year 10 students from St. Bede's competed in teams of four, tackling tasks such as building a bridge, creating a catapult, and designing a balloon-powered car. The challenges were judged on teamwork, design, aesthetics, and build quality. St. Bede's teams excelled, with one team securing second place and another third.



YOUR CHILD'S SCREEN TIME

Know the risks, and what you can do to help keep your child safe.

Spending time online and on devices can be a positive thing, especially for educational use.

However, high levels of screen time can put your child at greater risk of:

- Being bullied online
- Abuse and grooming (when someone builds a relationship with a child to exploit or abuse them)
- > Seeing inappropriate content
- Not getting enough sleep and exercise
- Disruption to learning and studying
- Negative effects on mental wellbeing

While it may be tempting to ban devices altogether, this also has some risks, as it can:

- Cause children to keep any screen time a secret, making it more difficult for them to seek help with bullying, harmful content or potential grooming
- Make children more prone to grooming, as abusers could offer them a 'secret' device
- Slow technology skill development. Technology is part of everyday life, and teaching children how to benefit from it can help prepare them for the future and develop online safety skills
 Block access to resources that could be beneficial, such as educational apps or websites

4 steps you can take to protect your child

- 1) Set parental controls on devices
- 2) Agree rules on screen time
- 3) Talk to your child about staying safe online
- 4) Encourage off-screen activities
